Sensory Room

We hope you enjoy this new addition to our resort. This room is free of charge, however we do ask our guests to read and agree to the following conditions:

- Sign for the sensory room key and for your understanding and agreement to these conditions.
- An adult must supervise children at all times.
- Only one or two children may use the room at one time (a sibling is welcome if they understand this is a quiet and calm room).
- Door is to be kept closed.
- All equipment is to be used as intended. Instructions on how to use equipment is posted around the room and also in the Sensory Room Book.
- Prevent children from throwing or breaking toys...we understand from time to time some toys may be broken. Parents are not expected to replace or pay for broken toys, however, we ask you to inform our staff if anything is broken or missing, so they can be replaced.
- Prevent children from putting objects in their mouth: if they do happen to put toys in their mouth, please return toy to office for cleaning.
- Show consideration for other families waiting to use room by limiting the time you spend in the room. If you find the room 'in use' you may quietly knock on the door and ask how long until the room will be free.
- When leaving the room we ask that all items be packed away and arranged as you found them, ready for the next family.
- All electrical equipment needs to be turned off at (using the light switch and General Power Outlet switch near the door)
- The door should be locked before leaving.
- Return sensory room key when checking out of the resort.

The 'Reilly Room' legacy




The room is lovingly dedicated to Reilly Watts who sadly passed away in
